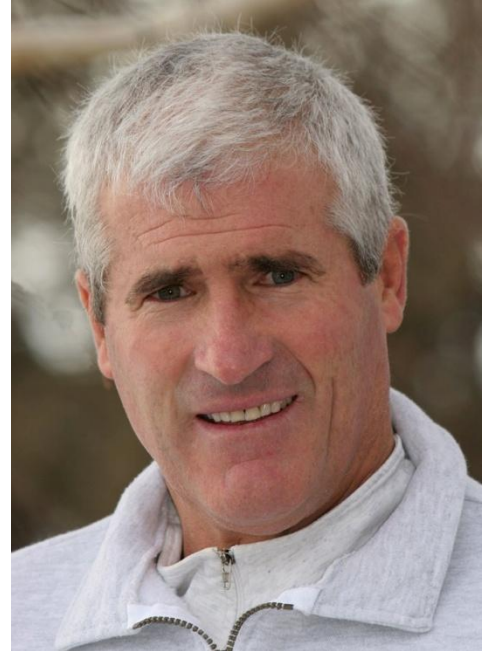
Speaker of the Month

Brian O'Keefe

Brian has been a serious fly fisher for the past thirty-five years. He developed an interest while spending summers in Montana with his grandparents. There he was taught the art of fly casting and fishing by a Montana dry fly purist, his grandfather, Fred Johnson.

Brian began fishing the world in 1973. Just out of high school, Brian began his adventures with a solo trip through New Zealand and Australia, and a trek into the Himalayan Mountains to fish for brown trout. After returning from this two-year adventure, he began guiding in the Northwest and Alaska for trout, salmon and steelhead. At age 30, Brian began his career as a fly fishing tackle rep and angling/outdoor photographer. He is also an accomplished fly casting instructor, earning the title of Master Certified Fly Casting Instructor from the Fly Fishing Federation. Brian has also placed in, and won many fly casting competitions.

Brian has traveled to some of the wildest and most remote angling destinations in the world, including: Bikini Atoll, the Seychelles, Kenya, Sierra Leone, Tonga and Kashmir. He has also traveled to more accessible locations, such as: the Bahamas, Belize, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Venezuela, Chile, New Zealand, Christmas Island and more. In many of these locations he again chose to venture off the beaten path, hiking, floating, sea-kayaking or taking a Zodiac into the backcountry. Inside our borders, Brian has specialized in fly fishing the Northern Rockies, the Northwest and Alaska. A camera goes on every trip to record the action.



Brian lives in Powell Butte, Oregon and continues to work as an angling and outdoor photographer, having had photographs published in: Field & Stream; Outdoor Life; Fly Fisherman; Fly, Rod and Reel; Fly Fishing Salt Waters; NW Flyfishing; Fish Alaska; Fly and Fish Magazine; Outside Magazine; Men's Journal and many others. Today, you could just as easily run into Brian on his way to a slide show presentation at your local fly fishing club, as you could in an airport on his way to fish a wilderness flat in the Bahamas.

WHY WE LOVE BROWN TROUT by Brian O'Keefe

This presentation will show sharp, colorful photos, via Power Point, of our beloved brown trout. The worldwide distribution, done by our angling forefathers, from England, Scotland and Germany has put this aggressive freshwater gamefish in places like New Zealand, Chile, Argentina and the United States. I will show these destinations, the rivers, tackle, guides and the spectacular scenery that surrounds the habitat of *Salmo Trutta*.

Whether sipping delicate PMD dry flies or whacking hoppers and streamers, browns keep us on our toes as they vacillate from a picky eater to suicidal maniac. "When in doubt, throw a mouse !"

I will show places for *do it yourself* angling and destinations where the lodges, guides, scenery and food/wine are as much fun as sneaking up on a rising 5 pounder.

FLY TYING WITH BILL BLACKSTONE

TIED DOWN CADDIS

Spring is upon us and I'll bet no one is busy tying for your next outing. How typical is this? I know I do it every year. I either spend the night before my first outing trying to get ahead or I say to myself, "well I'll just have to go with last years leftovers."

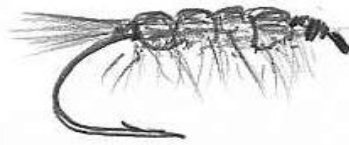
If you are like me or this sounds all too familiar, here are two patterns which are simple and fast which just might help get you off the hook.

You can count on Caddis, particularly in the early season when the waters are not warmed up yet. The hatches are slow, the floats are long, and the fish are far more eager to stay right in the film taking in as much food as possible.

You will find that this pattern is easy to tie, easy to fish, and is extremely productive with several fish varieties.

MATERIALS:

| | |
|------------------|----------------|
| Hook: | 94849 Mustad |
| Thread: | Black or Brown |
| Body: | Orange Yarn |
| Rib: | Brown Hackle |
| Tail & Overbody: | Deer Hair |



INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Wrap thread from the head space to the bend and half- hitch.
2. Tie in the brown hackle by the tip at the hook bend.
3. Tie in the orange yarn and an eight inch strand of yellow thread. Wrap the thread forward to the head space and half hitch
4. Form a conical shaped body with the yarn, tie off and trim at the head.
5. Wrap hackle forward, ribbing the body. Tie off and trim at the head.
6. Take a medium pinch of deer hair. Stack it and tie it in over the top of the body using the eight inch yellow thread strand. Tail length should equal the hook gap.
7. Take two turns of thread forward in equal spaces over the deer hair creating four equal spaces of two wraps each. Tie down at the head space and trim. Form head and whip finish.

Sespe Fly Fishers Conservation Notes

From our conservation director Dennis Harper

Sespe Fly Fishers Conservation Notes, April 6, 2008

North Matilija Creek

Santa Barbara Channelkeeper has issued a comprehensive report that documents concerns about significant adverse environmental impacts to North Matilija Creek resulting from a large landslide in March 2006 below the Mosler Rock Quarry. According to the Channelkeeper's report a significant barrier to steelhead migration has persisted since then as well as water quality turbidity degradations. In September 2007 several large rocks were removed from the streambed, yet stream flow was not restored and continued to flow sub-surface through the landslide area. A December 2007 site inspection by a certified professional engineer who specializes in fish passage projects determined that even under sufficient flow conditions the remediation will still present difficult challenges to adult steelhead and is highly likely to be impassable by resident trout and juveniles.

In June 2006, the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board issued a Cleanup and Abatement Order (CAO) to the owner of the Mosler Rock Ojai Quarry. The CAO requires stabilization of both right and left halves of the slope adjacent to Matilija Creek and to reduce or eliminate erosion from mining areas. It also required application for a 401 certification to clean out discharged boulders and nuisance into Matilija Creek immediately. To date a design for a long-term solution to fish passage and slope stabilization has not been presented.

Channelkeeper has presented a demand that relevant county, state and federal agencies work in a coordinated manner with Mosler Rock Ojai Quarry to immediately require remediation of North Fork Matilija Creek.

Citing Channelkeepers document, Ed Henke, a steelhead historical researcher has requested a Writ-of-Mandamus from the California Attorney General regarding the long lingering, unresolved issues having deleterious impacts on the endangered specie, Southern Steelhead. The North Fork of Matilija Creek is basically the only reliable perennial up-river segment of the Ventura River system that still has a measure of refugia area habitat remaining for the endangered southern steelhead to procreate.

Ojai Valley Land Conservancy

Update: Anyone planning to attend should make a reservation in advance by calling (805) 649-6852 or email at ovlc@ovlc.org.

Friday, April 25 from 7 to 8:30 pm, the Ojai Valley Land Conservancy will hold a meeting at their office to present their current projects. Nica Knite of CalTrout and Paul Jenkins will be speakers. OVLC has a \$2.5 million grant to restore approximately 1600 acres on the Rancho El Nido Unit (from just below the Robles Diversion Facility to the bridge to Lake Casitas). The next day meeting at the Riverview trailhead for a four hour tour to Matilija Dam with Paul, then back to the Ventura River Preserve for Stevie Adams to describe the projects there. Then on to the Ojai Meadows Preserve for a restoration tour there including showing the new creek and vernal pools. Arundo removal started on March 3. There is a \$10 donation for each program separately, but OVLC will also offer on site memberships which are \$25 and the events are free to members. The OVLC is very active in preserving and restoring the Ventura River watershed. Public support is encouraged for this very worthy organization.

Trout in the Classroom

We currently have six teachers in the Ventura and Camarillo areas who are participating with the club. According to the Fillmore Hatchery, trout eggs from the Sierra will be available to the program soon. At that time, I may ask for a couple of volunteers to help me deliver the eggs to the classrooms. This program has been very popular with those involved and the kids always look forward to watching the eggs develop into fry.

Fish of the Month

Largemouth Bass, Green Trout (*Micropterus salmoides*) is the largest member of the sunfish family. Often the apex predator in freshwater systems, these fish will eat anything that jumps, crawls, swims, dives, flies, or slithers. They start eating everything, including each other, at about 2 inches in size when they are 3 months old. They grow rapidly 4-6 inches for the next several years then slow down and start to put on weight. Males seldom exceed 16 inches, while females frequently surpass 22. Trophy fish are 10 + 10 females – at least 10 years and 10 pounds. Largemouth bass prefer to nest in quiet, vegetated water and will use any substrate like soft mud or submerged logs. Once the female has laid eggs in a nest (2,000 to 43,000), she is chased away by the male who then jealously guards the precious eggs. Their tendency to eat anything and their aggressive nature and willingness to strike makes them a great flyfishing target. Sometimes stripping divers through the water works; sometimes a slow count to 30 before popping a floater. With their great jaws and suction power, they literally create a sudden hole in the water and anything near flows right in. So there's a little more time to set the hook, but it takes a heart-beat to get over the strike anyway. Think summer, sun low in the sky, and glassy water over near the weeds.

A GREAT OPPORTUNITY

If you are relatively new to fly fishing and would like to learn more about real fishing with dry flies, then the Sierra Pacific FlyFishers Fly Fishing School at **Hot Creek Ranch** is for you. This School consists of two days of stream side instruction in groups of no more than 4 students by instructors who each have more than 30 years of experience and are expert fly fisherman. You also get a third day of fishing on your own to reinforce and enjoy the new knowledge you have gained. The emphasis is on catching and releasing trout from the world famous Hot Creek Ranch near Mammoth, California. Subjects that are taught include how to present your dry fly, how to mend, how to achieve a drag free drift, fly selection and where to look for fish. This school is best for students who can make a basic 30 foot cast and mastered knot tying. Instruction is tailored to the skills of the individual student. The more advanced the student, the more advanced the instruction. It is **not a casting clinic, it is a dry fly fishing school.**

The dates of the SPFF Fly Fishing School are June 6-9. The School includes lodging at Hot Creek Ranch (2 persons per cabin), two days of instruction, a third day of independent fishing and all meals. The cost is \$725 per person. The instructors and staff volunteer their time for this event and SPFF presents this School at cost, it makes **no profit.**

Tying Tips and Tricks

From Earl

Keep a powerful magnet handy at your tying station or in your kit. (Mine hangs on a 2 ft. string just below my vice). When you drop that size 24 midge you just slaved over, or a bare hook (or whole pack!) just swing the magnet an inch above the area and presto! Some times I find hooks I didn't even know I lost!

Magnetize Your Scissors. Just a little! Then you can use the tip of your scissors to pick up those tiny hooks. Just a couple drags across your magnet should magnetize them enough to pick up small hooks. Don't over do it, you don't want to be picking up the whole pile.

2008 BFE UPDATE and 2007 REVIEW

Our yearly fish raising goals were once again exceeded with some new and exciting upgrades to our capabilities. The success of our 2007 season was due in large part to tremendous support from private donations, grants from the Gary Cino Family Foundation, the California Inland Fisheries Foundation, and the tireless volunteer efforts of our own Foundation members.

We are very pleased to announce the completion of our Trout Transport Trailer. This easily towed, fully equipped fish hauler is capable of moving more than 500 pounds of fish to any of our Bridgeport area fisheries. We are also able to travel good distances to pick up our new batch of fingerlings, saving money on delivery while ensuring a safe, disease free environment as they travel to our two certified clean facilities. Our Paradise Shores Project operated by Eric and Michelle Gehrung is being upgraded in 2008 to increase trout growing capacity.

The impressive new Virginia Creek Settlement project has proven to be a dependable artesian well water facility with low maintenance and extremely high growth rates. The potential for this facility will allow our trout output to triple as we plan to add two new bins in 2008. Our bold experiment in which we raised both rainbows and browns through this past winter was a surprising success. Jimmy and Brinn Little were able to raise over 400 browns in one bin while losing only one fish. These trout are being stocked into our local waters in trophy sizes. They were also able to grow over 2,000 rainbows through the winter while losing less than 5% of the fish. The majority of these trout are being planted in the 6 to 10 inch size before April 26th.

Our 2007 stocking totals included an August stocking from Paradise Shores of 250 browns in the 10-12 inch range, then another stocking of 650 browns in early October that were between 12-14 inches. Our Virginia Creek facility has been designed to grow fish year round, but also chipped in with trout stockings in early November of 250 browns in the 12-14 inch range and another 125 browns in late November. These late season plants were designed to allow the browns to grow through the winter in our local waters to provide serious rod-bending action after the April 26th season opener.

Plans for 2008 include receiving over twenty thousand (20,000) baby browns in mid- April that will be split between our two facilities. With our proven success, we expect our most prolific season of brown trout stocking.

We appreciate the continued support of caring people.
